

LOCAL RULES

(To be read in conjunction with the Rules of Golf)

1.	OUT OF BOUNDS	Those areas beyond the course boundary fences.									
2	(Rule 18.2)	Those areas beyond any line of white stakes with black tops.									
2	(Nuie 10.2)	The Clubhouse and surrounding paths and gardens, and bitumen covered car park area.									
		Relief under Rule 16.1a is available for the practice chipping green only. The asphalt pathway adjoining the practice chipping green and areas beyond this poi									
		Out of Bounds.									
3.	STAKES	Stakes defining out of bounds are integral to the course and relief is not available (Rule 2.3).									
		All other stakes that define penalty areas, GUR, No Play Zones and the like are Movable Obstructions and the player should proceed under Rule 15.2.									
4.	RED PENALITY AREA S	All creeks, lakes, ponds and permanent drains marked by red stakes or lines are Red Penalty Areas.									
5.	(Rule 17)	Unless marked by red stakes or lines, the outside edge of a mower strip or rock wall defines the margin of a Red Penalty Area.									
	,	A ball touching the mower strip is deemed to be in the Red Penalty Area.									
		If the ball is not in the penalty area and the mowing strip or rock wall interferes with a player's stance or swing, free relief is available under Rule 16.1									
		Drop Zones									
		If a ball comes to rest in the Red Penalty Area at the rear of the 4th, 9th and 15th putting greens OR on the right hand side of the 5th green, after last crossing the									
		margin of the Red Penalty Area between the two blue coloured stakes, as an <u>additional option</u> under Rule 17.1, a ball may be dropped in the nearest marked drop									
		zone under penalty of one stroke.									
		Alternate Option of Opposite Margin Relief									
		When the ball last crossed the margin of the red penalty area (marked with red stakes with black tops) on holes 6 and 12, as an extra relief option adding one penalty stroke, the player may drop the original ball or another ball on the opposite side of the penalty.									
		Reference Point: the estimated point on the opposite side of the hazard that is no nearer the hole and is the same distance to the hole as the point where the ball									
		last crossed the penalty area but is not nearer to the hole.									
6.	ABNORMAL COURSE	Ground under repair									
	CONDITIONS (Rule	Relief <u>may</u> be taken from :									
	16.1)	i) All gardens adjacent to teeing grounds.									
		i) Corings placed in general area.									
		ii) Bird damage in the general area.									
		Relief <u>must</u> be taken from:									
		No Play Zones marked by orange stakes and/or lines.									
	Exposed tree roots										



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		If a player's ball is in the general area and there is interference from exposed tree roots that are in part of the general area cut to fairway height or less or in the rough within 4 club-lengths of the edge of the ground cut to fairway height or less, the tree roots are treated as ground under repair. The player may take relief under Rule 16.1b." Immovable obstructions								
		i) Retaining walls supporting the 1st, 4th ,5th ,6th ,7th ,8th ,11th ,17th and 18th tees.								
		ii) Exposed membrane in bunkers								
		The concrete drain from the edge of the 17 th fairway, across the 2 nd fairway to the boundary fence on the right-hand side of the 2 nd fairway.								
		N) Any pathway formed from either concrete or asphalt. All other tracks or service roads are to be treated as GUR.								
7.	LINE OF PLAY RELIEF	During play of the 1st hole, if the protective fence behind and beside the 1st green is on a player's line of play:								
	FROM PROTECTIVE	The player may take relief by dropping a ball and playing it from the drop zone that is located adjacent to the left-hand green side bunker.								
	FENCE	This relief is only allowed if the ball is in play nearer the hole than where the dropping zone is located (Rule 14.3).								
8.	IMMOVABLE	In addition to the types of interference described in rule 16.1a, when a ball lies in the general area, interference also exists if an immovable obstruction is:								
	OBSTRUCTIONS CLOSE	i) On the player's line of play,								
	TO THE PUTTING	i) Within two club-lengths of the putting green and,								
	GREEN	ii) Within two club-lengths of the ball.								
		The player may take relief under Rule 16.1b. (Exception – There is no relief if the player chooses a line of play that is clearly unreasonable).								
		PLEASE SEE PROSHOP WINDOW FOR TEMPORARY LOCAL RULES								
	USE OF MOBILE	The use of a mobile phone by a player or his caddie is permitted for Emergency use or if there is no potential distraction to other players. In other instances, the use								
	TELEPHONES	may be considered a serious breach of the rules of etiquette. Penalties may apply. Rule 1.2								
		Unless otherwise noted, the penalty for a breach of a Local Rule is the general penalty (stroke play – two strokes, match play – loss of hole).								

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If the Committee determines that preferred lies are in play, the following applies.

When a player's ball lies in a part of the general area cut to fairway height or less, the player may take free relief once by placing the original ball in and playing it from this relief area (Refer Rule 14.2a):

- i) Reference Point: Spot of the original ball.
- i) Size of Relief Area Measured from Reference Point: 300mm from the reference point, but with these limits:
- ii) <u>Limits on Location of Relief Area</u>:

Must not be nearer the hole than the reference point, and

Must be in the general area.

In proceeding under this Local Rule, the player must choose a spot to place the ball and use the procedures for replacing a ball under $\underline{\text{Rules}}$ $\underline{14.2\text{b}(2)}$ and $\underline{14.2\text{e}}$. The ball may be cleaned before being replaced.
